WALKING IN THE BLESSINGS OF ABRAHAM is crucial for believers today because it connects us to God's timeless promises, reaffirming His faithfulness and provision for His people. Many mistakenly think these blessings, as outlined in the Bible, were only for Abraham and his descendants in a historical or cultural context. However, Scripture emphasizes that through Jesus Christ, all believers become heirs to the promises made to Abraham.

Galatians 3:29 declares, “If you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham’s seed, and heirs according to the promise.” This underscores that these blessings—ranging from spiritual inheritance to divine favor, guidance, and protection—are relevant and accessible to us today.

THE BLESSINGS OF ABRAHAM encompass both spiritual and practical aspects of life. Spiritually, they signify a covenant relationship with God, marked by righteousness, faith, and a secure identity as children of God. Practically, they reflect



God's provision, success, and well-being, empowering believers to live victoriously and bless others. By walking in these blessings, Christians can demonstrate the transformative power of God's promises in everyday life, serving as a testimony to His unchanging faithfulness.

EMBRACING THE BLESSINGS OF ABRAHAM also reminds us that the Church, as the body of Christ, carries the **inheritance** of these promises. Through faith, we are grafted into the lineage of Abraham, as Paul describes in Romans 11. Thus, the blessings are not limited to a distant time or specific people but extend to all who live by faith in Christ. By understanding and living in these truths, believers can confidently claim their God-given inheritance and experience the abundant life that Jesus came to provide.

Week One

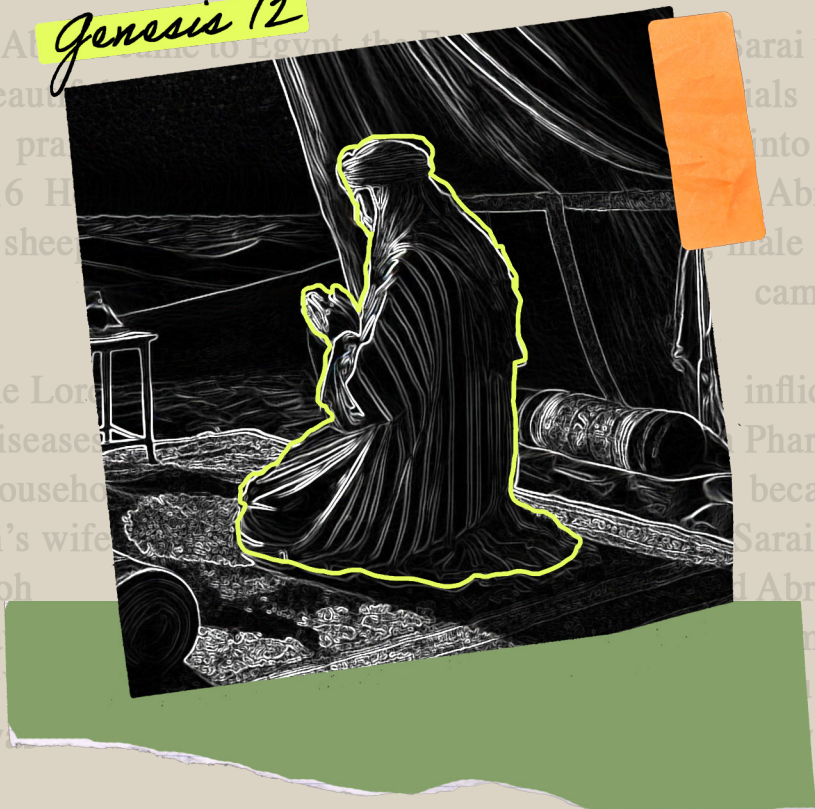
THE CALL OF ABRAHAM

God calls Abram (later named Abraham) to leave his homeland, family, and father's house and journey to a land God will show him. In Genesis 12:2, God promises Abram that He will make him into a great nation, bless him, make his name great, and that Abram will bless others. Abram trusts God's promise through faith and **obedience** and embarks on the journey without knowing his destination. This moment is a reminder that God often calls His people to trust in His plan, even when it doesn't make sense, and that His promises are trustworthy, guiding us through the unknown.

10 Now there was a famine in the land, and Abram went down to Egypt to live there for a while because the famine was severe. 11 As he was about to enter Egypt, he said to his wife Sarai, "I know what a beautiful woman you are.

12 When the Egyptians see you, they will say, 'This is his wife.' Then they will kill me but will let you live. 13 Say you are my sister, so that I will be treated well for your sake and my life will be spared because of you."

14 When Abram came to Egypt, the Egyptians saw Sarai was a very beautiful woman. When Pharaoh saw her, he called for Abram and said, "This is your wife." Week Two

THE BLESSING OF MELCHIZEDEK

After Abraham's victory in rescuing Lot, he meets Melchizedek, king of Salem, who blesses him and acknowledges God's protection over his life (Genesis 14:18-20). This encounter highlights that victory and success come from God's provision and protection and that Abraham recognizes this by giving a tenth of the spoils back to God. It serves as a reminder that all blessings and victories are gifts from God, and we are called to acknowledge His sovereignty in our lives.

Family Discussion: How does recognizing God’s hand in our victories change the way we view our successes? What victories in our lives can we praise God for today?

Week Three

THE PROMISE CHILD

When she despise her mistress. 5 Then Sarai said to Abram, "I am responsible for the wrong I am suffering because I have given my Egyptian slave to you, and now that she knows she is pregnant, she despises me. May the Lord judge me."

In Genesis 16:1-4, Abraham and Sarah, in their impatience, try to fulfill God's promise of descendants by having a child through Hagar. This decision brings challenges, but it also reveals that God's promises remain unshaken, even when we attempt to help Him fulfill them in our own way. God reaffirms that His plan will come to pass through Isaac, reminding us that His timing and method are perfect, even when we struggle with impatience.

"Your slave Hagar has borne you a son," said the Lord. "Do with her whatever you think best, for she is under your control." 6 And Abram said to Sarai, "As the Lord has said, 'Do with her whatever you think best.'"

7 The angel of the Lord said to Sarai, "I have heard that you are despising Hagar; so she fled. 8 And he said, 'Do with her whatever you think best.'"

9 Then the angel of the Lord told her, "Go back to your mistress and submit to her." 10 The angel added, "I will increase your descendants so much that they will be too numerous to count."

11 The angel of the Lord also said to her:

You are now pregnant and you will give birth to a son. You shall name him Ishmael,[a] for the Lord has heard of your misery. 12 He will be a wild donkey of a man; his hand will be against everyone and everyone's hand against him, and he will show hostility toward his brothers."

Prayer Focus: Ask God to help you build a lasting legacy of faith.

Week Four

A NEW NAME

In Genesis 17:4-5, God changes Abram's name to Abraham, signifying that he will be the father of many nations. This new name represents a transformation, as Abraham's identity is tied to God's covenant promise.

Just as God saw a greater purpose in Abraham's life than Abraham could initially understand, He invites His people into a deeper identity tied to His purposes for the future.

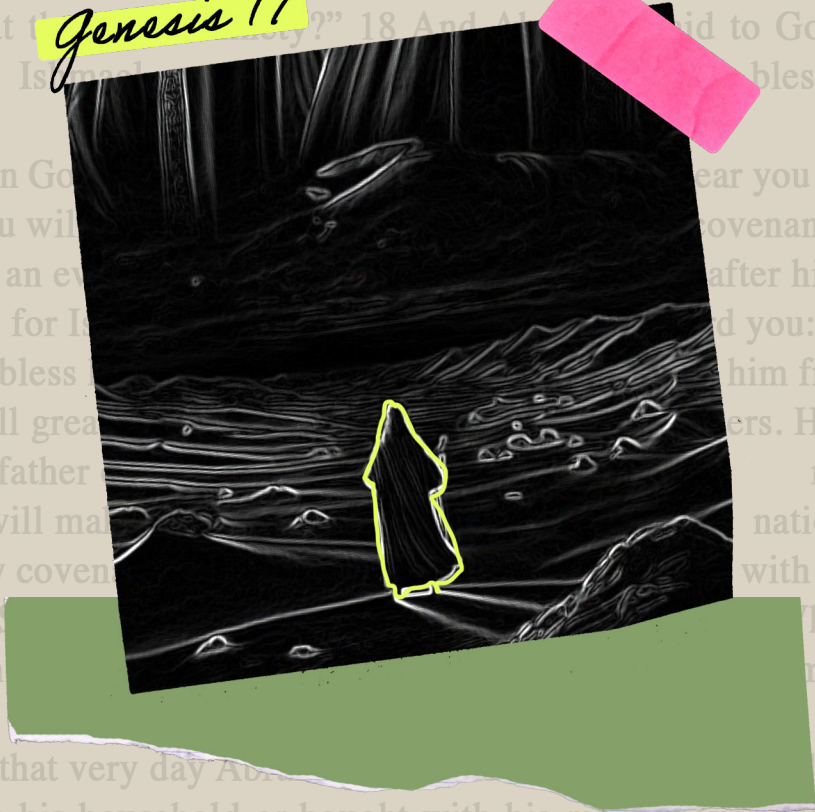

Family Discussion: How is Abraham’s transformation like the new identity we receive in Christ?

Prayer Focus: Pray that your heart would be open to Spiritual transformation and new identity God has given you.

Family Discussion: How did Abraham’s faith in God’s promise shape his journey? What does this teach us about trusting God with our future?

Prayer Focus: Pray for strong faith in God’s promises, trusting Him to fulfill His purposes in your life and future.

Week Five

RECEIVING & SACRIFICING THE PROMISE

In Genesis 22:1-2, God tests Abraham's faith by asking him to sacrifice Isaac, the son of promise. Abraham's obedience, even in this difficult moment, reflects his deep trust in God's plan and provision. This passage foreshadows God's ultimate sacrifice of His own Son, Jesus, through whom all nations will be blessed, and it underscores the truth that God's plans are greater than any immediate challenge or sacrifice we may face.

15 God also said to Abraham, "As for Sarai your wife, you are no longer to call her Sarai; her name will be Sarah. 16 I will bless her and will surely give you a son by her. I will bless her so that she will be the mother of nations; kings of peoples will come from her."

17 Abraham fell facedown; he laughed and said to himself, "Will a son be born to a man a hundred years old? Will Sarah bear a child at the age of ninety?" 18 Then he said to God, "If only Ishmael might be blessed!"

Family Discussion: How does Abraham’s willingness to sacrifice Isaac point us to God’s sacrifice of Jesus? Why is this ultimate sacrifice so important for us?

Prayer Focus: Thank God for the gift of Jesus and pray for a deeper understanding of the love and sacrifice He demonstrated through His Son.

Family Discussion: How does this verse remind us of God’s generosity? What does it mean to trust that God will meet all our needs, just as He provided for Abraham?

Prayer Focus: Pray for the faith to trust God’s generosity and provision, thanking Him for always giving us what we need according to His perfect plan.

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Week Six

KINGS FROM ABRAHAM

“I will make you exceedingly fruitful, and I will make nations of you, and kings shall come from you.” (Genesis 17:6) God’s promise to Abraham, that kings would come from his line, shows us the royal authority and spiritual purpose behind his descendants. From King David to Jesus, the King of Kings, this promise is a testament to God’s faithfulness and power. Prayer Focus: Father, help me represent Your kingdom with confidence and humility.

___ **“If we endure, we shall also reign with Him.” 2 Timothy 2:12**

Family Discussion: What does it mean to reign with Christ? How can our family live in a way that reflects our royal inheritance as God’s children?

Prayer Focus: Lord, give me strength to endure and remain faithful, knowing I will reign with You in Your Kingdom.
